

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

As parishioners and visitors marvel at the beauty of this Church, there will be some new/old items that will adorn the recently renovated areas.

ALTAR PLAQUES

Two altar plaques that once adorned the old High Altar at Holy Cross have been restored. These plaques were removed from the old High Altar and were installed on the back wall of the church in the 1970s & 1980s before they were removed and placed in the basement.

These two plaques (an Angel of the Lord handing Jesus the Chalice) & (Jesus Christ after his Resurrection) will once again adorn the back wall in the gathering space where they were 40 years ago. The "Risen Christ" is placed on the East side. The east is considered the direction of the rising sun, representing the new life brought by Christ's resurrection.



STATUES OF JESUS

In addition to the altar plaques, two Jesus statues were also restored. These two Jesus statues adorned the sanctuary area of Holy Cross in the early years of the Church. After the High Altar was removed, the statues were relocated and eventually moved to the basement of the church along with the altar plaques.

The crown of thorns symbolized the royalty and majesty of a king and served as their futile attempt to humiliate Jesus and make fun of his rights to kingship. They put a reed in Jesus' hand to represent a royal scepter to complete the look. The point of the entire cruel joke was to mock Jesus for His "crime" of claiming to be "king of the Jews" (Matthew 27:11)




Statue of the Sacred Heart of Jesus

The Sacred Heart is a symbol of God's love, which is revealed in the pierced heart of Jesus. It also represents Jesus' humility and meekness, and the idea that love can conquer sin and death.










Old High Altar in Current Holy Cross Church. Circles represent the Altar Plaques and the Rectangles represent the two Jesus Statues

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

All 14 Stations of the Cross at Holy Cross have been restored as well. The Stations of the Cross are a devotional practice that involves visiting and praying at each of the 14 stations, while meditating on the Passion of Christ. The practice originated with early Christian pilgrims who would visit the sites of the events in Jerusalem and walk the traditional route from Pilate's house to Calvary.

The Stations of the Cross at Holy Cross are "Emmerich Stations of the Cross" and are named after Blessed Anne Catherine Emmerich, a German nun and mystic who wrote the Dolorous Passion of Our Lord Jesus Christ. According to an ancient tradition, the Blessed Mother is credited with creating the first Way of the Cross. Blessed Anne Catherine Emmerich is said to have received details about the devotion's origins from the Blessed Mother.

The Stations of the Cross at Holy Cross Wendelin are believed to date back to the late 1800s.
